## 1. Executive Summary

Oak Tree School is a proposed new special school in the Boroughs of Reading and Wokingham. Maiden Erlegh Trust (MET) undertook a 6-week consultation, in accordance with the statutory requirements, which was open from the 7<sup>th</sup> June 2021 to the 19<sup>th</sup> July 2021.

The purpose of this consultation is to fulfil the statutory duty to inform the community of the plans for the proposed special school, and to consult with stakeholders and the local community on their views, in particular whether MET should enter into a funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education.

We received 51 survey responses to the consultation on SurveyMonkey. Consultees were also given the option to submit responses by post or email.

88% (45) of respondents supported the proposal to establish the school.

## 2. Introduction

Reading Borough Council (RBC) and Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) have identified a gap in specialist provision for the increasing numbers of learners with SEND. As a result, they are currently sending significant numbers of learners with SEND to out of area provision, which is causing a significant budget, resulting in overspending and children being separated from families and communities.

To alleviate this, the above partner Local Authorities proposed the new Oak Tree School; a special school for pupils in Year 1 to Year 13, which is planned to open in September 2022.

The school is being established by Maiden Erlegh Trust, a multi-academy trust (MAT) formed in 2011. The Trust comprises of six academies with three mainstream secondary schools, one primary school, 1 SEMH special school and one AP Academy.

Oak Tree School will be located on Winnersh Farm, Wokingham. It will meet the needs of children and young people aged 5-18 with complex needs including Social, Emotional and Mental Health and/or Autism Spectrum Disorder diagnoses. The new provision will be for children with multiple and complex needs, but also learners who may cognitively be able to access mainstream courses but have needs that would not make a mainstream environment appropriate for them.

When full, the school will provide provision for a total of up to 150 learners. All learners at the school will have an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan. The Local Authorities of Wokingham and Reading will commission all places in the school.

Oak Tree School will be a high-quality school community. The ethos will be one of ambition, relevance, optimism, care and joy for all stakeholders, especially learners. Relationships will be built on a foundation of respect and kindness and the school will use therapeutic approaches to behaviour management and social and communication needs.

### 3. Background

Free schools and academies approved to open by the Department for Education must conduct a thorough and transparent statutory consultation with parents and local stakeholders before a final funding agreement can be put in place.

This is known as a Section 10 Consultation, as set out in Section 10 of the Academies Act 2010. The Act states that you should consult such persons as the Trust thinks appropriate. The key question for which Trusts are required to consult is whether the Trust should set up the free school.

MET Trustees devised and implemented a consultation exercise, supported by Trust staff and AMR Consult, which sought the views of parents, stakeholders, and the wider community on whether MET should enter into a funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education and open Oak Tree School.

## 4. Vision and Ethos

### 4.1 Vision

Maiden Erlegh Trust considers each school in its family to be a working community, led by positive and ethical leaders and enriched by staff, parents and students from diverse backgrounds.

We prioritise the education, well-being and happiness of every student. We aim for each school in our Trust to be a school of opportunity and success, so support learners of all abilities to make the most progress possible and enjoy learning. Each school ensures that its students thrive personally as well as academically. We want them to develop confidence, motivated by a strong sense of personal worth and respect for others. As such, we value participation in and contribution to the community, not just the end results.

We aim to bring out the best in students of all abilities and to meet each child's needs. Community, inclusion and respect are key Maiden Erlegh Trust values and they underpin our vision for Oak Tree School. We work with our partners and listen to parents and children to realise this vision. We recognise each and every one of our students as individuals, and seek to nurture their potential, developing the whole child by supporting them intellectually, emotionally, socially, and physically.

We will provide:

- A safe, calm, respectful and happy place to work and learn
- Stimulating and challenging learning for all
- High quality and inspiring teaching
- A rich and relevant curriculum
- Varied and exciting extra-curricular opportunities
- High quality and personalised pastoral care
- Strong leaders and staff

### 4.2 Ethos

We aim to build a family of schools in which a community ethos prevails. The key values that Oak Tree School will aim to uphold are as follows:

- Mutual respect
- Equality
- Inclusion
- An understanding of other cultures
- Empathy with the wider world

## 5. Consultation Methodology

### 5.1 Scope and Timing of the Consultation

The S10 Consultation was held between 7<sup>th</sup> June 2021 and 19<sup>th</sup> July 2021. Before the beginning of the consultation, the Project Steering Group containing Trustees and staff (with delegated powers from the Trust Board) agreed a consultation plan and stakeholder mapping exercise to ensure that the consultation was publicised to all relevant stakeholders.

### 5.2 Publicising the Consultation

As part of its general communications strategy for Oak Tree School, MET prepared a website available for public access. The website included details of the school's proposed vision and ethos, curriculum delivery, admission policy and link to online survey.

A database of 648 local stakeholders across the Boroughs of Wokingham and Reading, and its neighbouring areas, was collated, and included:

- Department for Education;
- Borough of Wokingham, Borough of Reading and other appropriate Local Authorities, such as West Berkshire, Bracknell Forest and South Oxfordshire;
- Neighbouring schools;
- Local Members of Parliament (MP);
- SEND groups;
- Local community groups; and
- Local businesses.

In addition, MET contacted parents/carers of pupils at Maiden Erlegh Trust schools, prospective parents/carers of pupils at Oak Tree School and 731 contacts on the staff list.

Emails were distributed to the stakeholders inviting them to learn more about the school and share their views (see **Appendix 2**). Information about the consultation events and a link to the online survey were included and distributed to stakeholders.

MET posted information about the consultation on the Oak Tree School website (**Appendix 3**), along with the brochure (**Appendix 4**). The Trust also posted advertisements in the local papers Reading Chronicle and Wokingham Paper (**Appendix 5**) and sent a newsletter out to approximately 1000 people (**Appendix 6**), also accessible on the Trust and school's websites.

In addition to this, the Trust posted on Twitter to further promote the consultation events and survey, to their 83 and 630 followers respectively. The posts are contained in **Appendix 7**.

### 5.3 Providing Opportunities for Feedback and Questions

Two online consultation events were organised:

- Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> June 2021, 17:30 – 18:30, Virtual/Zoom
- Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> July 2021, 17:30 – 18:30, Virtual/Zoom

The consultation events provided background information on MET as well as the Trust's proposal to establish Oak Tree School. Updates on the progress of the site were provided during the consultation event and general updates on the overall pre-opening timeline of the school. A question and answer session was held following the presentation, which can be found in **Appendix 8**.

These consultation events took place over the video conferencing software Zoom, due to the ongoing COVID-19 restrictions.

In addition to the events, an online survey was set up using SurveyMonkey, which can be viewed in full in **Appendix 9**. This survey comprised of 6 questions about the proposed school and the respondent, each with space to add comments and explain their views. It also provided respondents with the space to add additional details on who they are.

In addition, consultation notices contained alternative contact details including Maiden Erlegh's postal address, and a monitored email account. MET received a request for the link to the consultation event, a message of thanks from the SENCO at a local primary, a message of support from the deputy head of another, and one question regarding the location of Oak Tree School (addressed in section 7.3 below).

## 6. Engagement in the Consultation

Comments and questions were invited at the Consultation Engagement Events. These were attended by 27 and 24 stakeholders, respectively. The attendees ranged from prospective and future parents, local Councillors and staff from existing provisions in the area. At each Event, the majority of questions were from parents interested in the process for helping their child to attend Oak Tree School, whether by asking about provision, the admissions process and curriculum offer. The full list of these questions and a precis of answers given can be found in **Appendix 8**.

Each event ran for approximately an hour and was attended by representatives of MET and Oak Tree School, representatives from project management, as well as representatives from the borough councils and Brighter Futures for Children. The events began with Mary Davies (CEO) presenting an overview of the proposal for the new school, followed by Richard Tipping from Wokingham talking about the need for SEND support in the borough. At the first event Prof. Kate Reynold, Director of Education at Brighter Futures for Children, spoke next, and at the second Councillor Ashley Pearce from Reading spoke next.

This was followed by Alison Walker (Director of Inclusion and Safeguarding) discussing welfare and relationships, Mandy Wilton (Executive Headteacher) presenting on teaching and curriculum, and representatives from REDS10 explaining the school design and layout. The survey was marketed and ways that further comments and feedback could be given were explained, and then the floor was opened to questions and discussion. A copy of the presentation used can be found in **Appendix 10**.

At each Event, attendees were very positive about the new school. With the majority of recurring questions relating to provision, admissions and how they could apply for a place for their child in the school, and related matters.

The most commonly asked questions regarded:

- The admissions process;
- How the Trust would ensure local voices were heard;
- Oak Tree School provision and what special needs would be catered for;
- The timescale of the opening;
- How the school would be run and the role of the governing body;
- Recruitment.

There were no questions or comments regarding the consultation itself. Questions regarding the pre-opening process mainly concerned the progress of the site.

There were no challenges to the proposed school expressed at the events.

## 7. Findings from the consultation

The statutory consultation survey received a total of 51 responses. The survey enabled each respondent to provide both quantitative and qualitative analysis.

The results covering each of the 6 questions are presented below, and the questions are listed in the format given in the survey in **Appendix 9**.

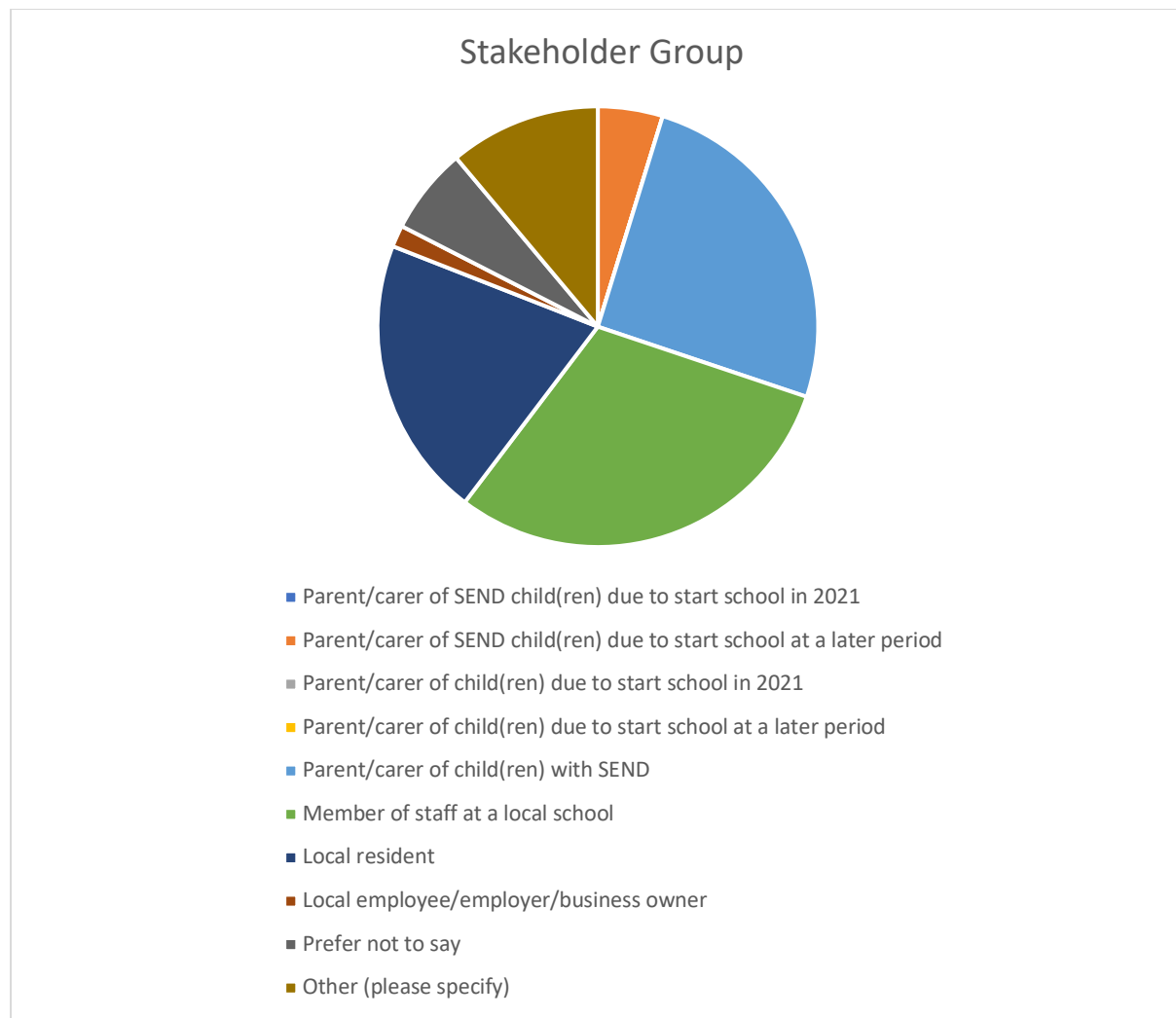
### 7.1 Stakeholder Group

In Q6, respondents were asked which stakeholder group they identified themselves as belonging to. Respondents also had the opportunity to provide additional details regarding who they were in a free text box in Q7.

Most respondents, 37.25% (19), identified as a member of staff at a local school, followed by 31.37% (16) as a parent/carer of child(ren) with SEND, and 25.49% (13) as local residents. Four respondents declined to answer.

Of those listing themselves as Other, 7 provided more details, including:

- “Grandparent of an 8-year-old child with Autistic needs”
- “Head of [local school]”
- “Parent of non-SEND child”
- “I am a SENCO in a local primary school”
- “Member of staff at Maiden Erlegh School in Reading”

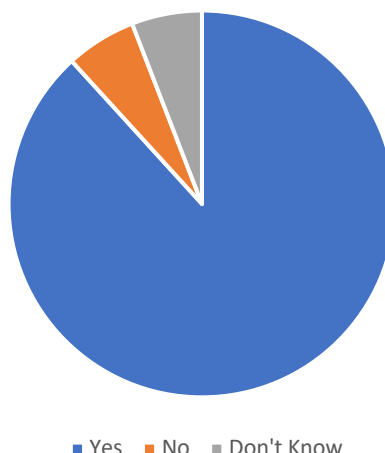


## 7.2 Views regarding Oak Tree School

### Q1. Do you support Maiden Erlegh Trust’s proposal to open a new special school as part of a partnership between the boroughs of Reading and Wokingham?

Of the 100% respondents who completed this question, 88.24% (45) answered Yes, 5.88% (3) answered No, and 5.88% (3) answered Don’t Know.

Do you support Maiden Erlegh Trust's proposal to open a new special school as part of a partnership between the boroughs of Reading and Wokingham?



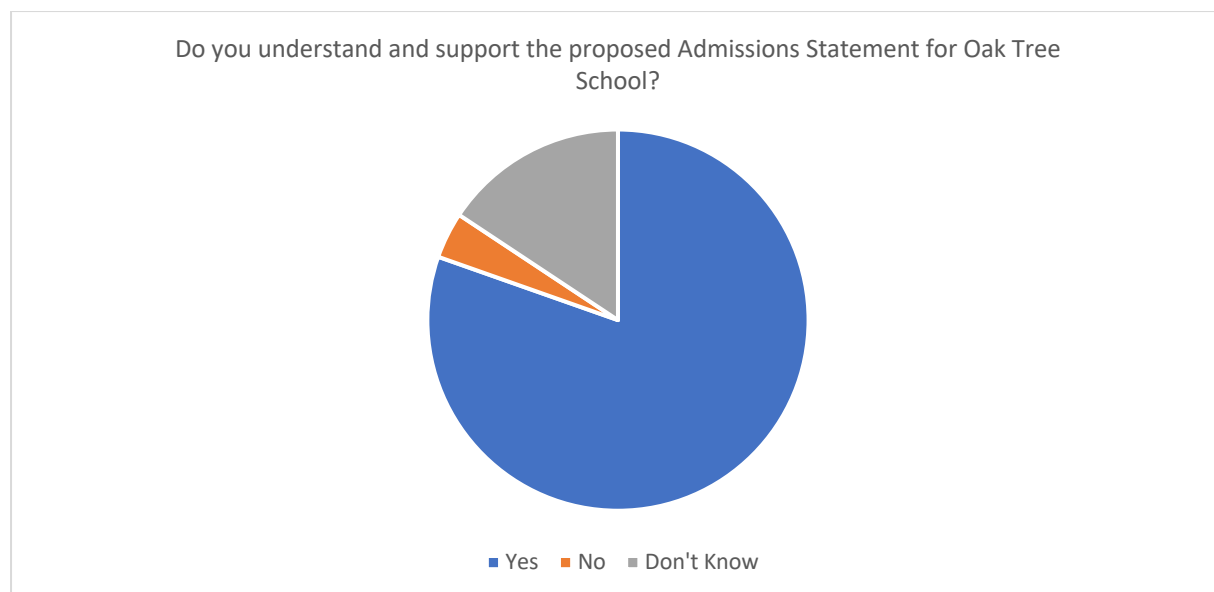
We asked people to give reasons for their answers and received 36 responses, the vast majority of which expressed support for the new school. Answers are listed below:

- “Mainstream schools do not meet the needs of many SEND children, despite their best efforts.”
- “We need more provision for children who cannot cope with mainstream schooling.”
- “There is a huge need for more special schools for those with SEMH difficulties. Currently many students struggle in the current provision.”
- “Being a teacher I see so many complex needs of children who in my experience are in ‘mainstream’ school where they’re not receiving specialist help that they need.”
- “Wokingham borough has for years had a shortage of SEN schools within the borough and it was mentioned in their last Ofsted report.”
- “I live in Finchampstead and my son goes to a special school in Slough. There wasn’t anywhere suitable locally so this will be great for local children.”
- “I am concerned about the statement ‘using therapeutic approaches to behaviour management and social and communication needs’. Does this include Applied Behavioural Analysis (ABA) or Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) .... such approaches do not have an evidence base and are widely recognised by the Autistic / Neurodiverse community to cause harm.”
- “There is a lack of suitable places for autistic children at the moment.”
- “We have increasing numbers of children coming into mainstream provision with additional complex needs. I feel many of these children need an individualised curriculum and provision to allow them to thrive and reach their full potential. All too often in mainstream schools needs cannot be met effectively.”
- “High level of need.”
- “Much needed for Reading and Wokingham pupils.”
- “We need more special schools in the area.”
- “There is already significant need for specialist provision in Wokingham and I am already concerned that the school is not going to be big enough.”
- “There is a desperate shortage of special school places in the borough.”
- “Would prefer just Wokingham children.”
- “There is a desperate shortage of schools for children with additional needs in the local area.”

- “We need more special schools as there are not enough places for all that need them.”
- “My son had to travel far out of Wokingham to attend an appropriate school for his needs. Such a school is long overdue in this area.”
- “We have a significant number of children with EHCPs in our school who are identified as needing a special school. Unfortunately they are currently waiting years, in some cases, for a place.”
- “Too many children with Special Educational Needs in the area are not receiving the support they need in standard schools which is detrimental to these children and this is also disruptive to other pupils.”
- “Why keep adding more SEN schools when there are already enough and not enough mainstream schools?”
- “There are not enough spaces in the specialist providers we have in this area so children are often left placed in the wrong school or not placed at all. We also need more specialist providers that go up to Y13.”
- “This type of education is vital for those who can't manage mainstream education. And places elsewhere are severely limited.”
- “There is a chronic shortage of special school places in the borough and I think this school can only be positive.”
- “Maiden Erlegh Trust has a monopoly in Reading.”
- “Where would this school be located?”
- “Schools like this are needed.”
- “There are not enough places in the existing special schools in the area, and children are sent to costly independent schools.”
- “There is a significant demand for SEN places locally, and the more children that can be educated closer to their home the better.”
- “There is a lack of provision, oversubscribed SEN schools and many children missing out.”
- “There is clearly a need for this provision and it will have a positive impact on the futures of children who attend.”
- “There are not enough schools in the local area for special needs and any additional school places will benefit the students and the local area.”
- “Already working within the Trust, I feel that a school of such nature would be highly beneficial to a selection of students within the community that already struggle to regulate their emotions.”

**Q2. Do you understand and support the proposed Admissions Statement for Oak Tree School?**

Of the 100% respondents who completed this question 80.39% (41) answered Yes, 3.92% (2) answered No and 15.69% (8) answered Don't Know.

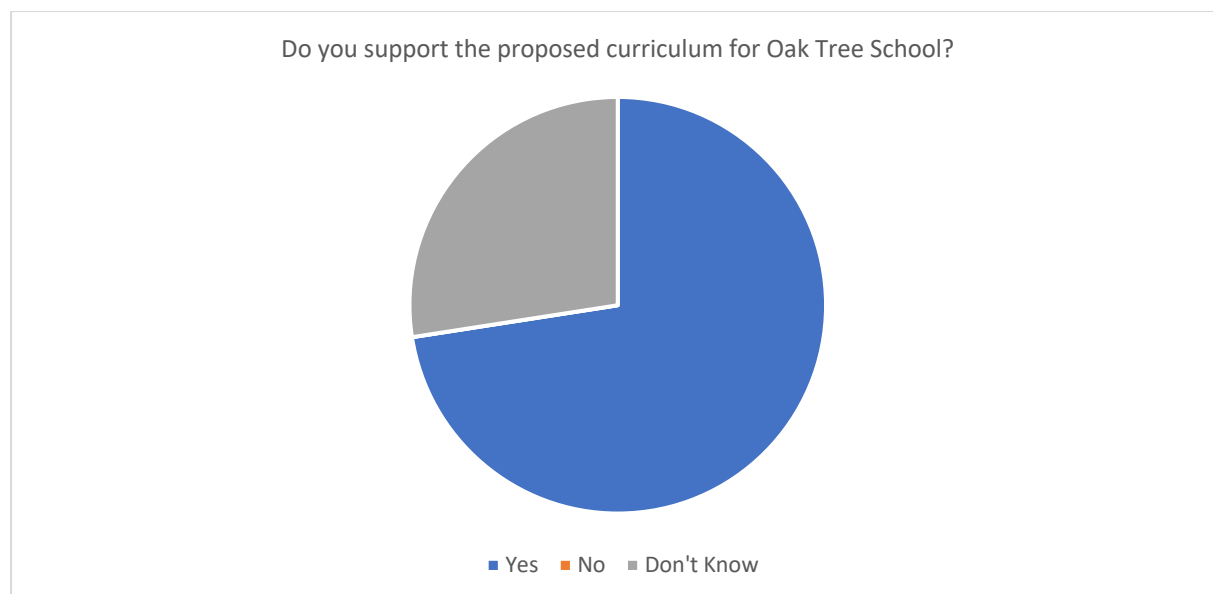


We asked people to give reasons for their answers and received 11 responses, they are as follows:

- “Have not seen the admission statement.”
- “Haven’t seen it.”
- “Similar to others.”
- “Therapeutic approach and personal development.”
- “No details.”
- “Although we understand priority should be given to the children with complex needs, we also think that we should give an opportunity to the other children with special needs who do not have EHCP.”
- “It’s not clear from the statement what cohort the school is aimed at. Are these academically able children or children who are academically behind? What level of need is going to be catered for?”
- “SEN schools always take priority and leave the mainstream schools struggling.”
- “I haven’t heard what they are.”
- “More definition required to help parents know if this is suitable - and whether pupils from West Berkshire would be eligible.”
- “Clarity on whether EHCP has to be finalised before naming place or whether Oak Tree can admit whilst an EHCP is still in draft form.”

### Q3. Do you support the proposed curriculum for Oak Tree School?

Of the 100% of respondents who completed this question 72.55% (37) answered Yes, 0% (0) answered No and 27.45% (14) answered Don’t Know.



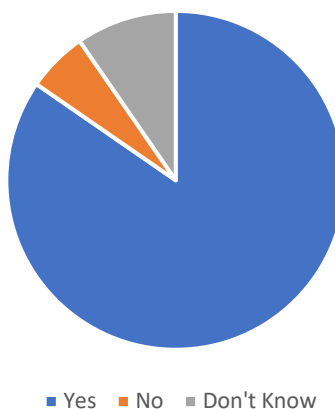
We asked people to give reasons for their answers and received 8 responses.

- “I think the idea of a learning journey sounds great. Any curriculum will need to take into account where the children are currently and what their next steps need to be. Hopefully this will be done in a playful environment, where the children can learn through exploring ideas and learning to interact with others.”
- “Haven’t seen it.”
- ‘Brochure does not specify what range of qualifications will be on offer – academic qualifications as well as life skills?’
- “No details.”
- “Based on the short summary, we fully support Oak Tree School's broad approach and not only focusing on academic but also social, cultural and personal. We also appreciate the fact that the parents would be involved in the learning journey.”
- “It’s not very clear what the curriculum will entail form [sic] the document and without knowing more about the target cohort it is difficult to tell how suitable the curriculum will be.”
- “I haven’t heard what it is.”
- “No mention of GCSEs.”

**Q4. Do you agree that the Oak Tree School should open in September 2022, which would involve entering into a funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education?**

Of the 100% of respondents who completed this question, 86.27% (44) answered Yes, 3.92% (2) answered No, and 9.8% (5) answered Don't Know.

We asked people to give reasons for their answers and received 10 responses, the majority of which expressed firm agreement with the plan to open the new school. They are as follows:

- “The sooner the better.”
- “The quicker the better there are too few spaces in the borough for SEN children.”
- “Schools need this support now.”
- “The school is needed asap.”
- “The sooner, the better.”
- “As above, special school places are desperately needed in the borough.”
- “The school is needed.”
- “It’s all about business and not education. This is why our children suffer!”
- “We need spaces as soon as possible!”
- “Funding should be used on existing schools in Reading.”

#### **Q5. Do you have any additional comments?**

This qualitative section offered respondents the opportunity to express any additional comments. Responses to comments, where applicable, are listed in section 7.3.

These comments were made by 9 of the 51 respondents, and are listed here.

- “Will MET be seeking to collaborate with other SEMH providers in the local area?”
- “Wokingham desperately needs more specialist provision for children with additional needs. There appear to be more children than available places and children who are not having their needs met in a mainstream setting. I think this can only be a positive addition to our local area.”
- “Wokingham is in desperate need for additional specialist provision, particularly with the amount of young F1 and F2 children coming up. There does need to be a strong emphasis that this school deals with the most complex needs child. I am concerned that some parents whose children have a diagnosis of ASD and who have an EHCP may feel that they want their child to go to this school, but their needs could easily be managed within mainstream provision.”

- “From the very high level outline provided it doesn’t look like the proposed new school will help hard to place children who need a much more creative and alternative approach to education. This is a real missing in this area and forces these children to travel a long distance or into residential placements. More special school places of any sort are very welcome however.”
- “What do you know about SEN and what’s in it for you?”
- “The provision is a drop in the ocean in terms of needs. There needs to be many more secondary provisions meeting needs - more opportunities for smaller classes with more support staff, outdoor areas - continue forest school practices. I really fear for all our family’s mental health as our son begins mainstream in 2022, there are no ‘choices’ it’s a ‘hope for the best’ strategy.”
- “Perhaps if more mainstream schools were built then it would be a good idea but you are pushing the non-SEND children out and not giving them an equal chance.”
- “We cannot believe that firstly you would build this by a small local infant school then add to the traffic which is already a HUGE issue. We would like the pupils to be supervised when leaving the site, making sure they leave the estate.”
- “The location beside the M4 is not a suitable location in the light of recent children dying as a result of pollution as recorded in a recent inquest especially for special needs children. Wokingham BC has just closed Farley Hill Primary School which is a more suitable location for children.”

In addition, as a response to Q6 asking for more details regarding each respondent, some gave further comments regarding the school:

- “I know from work I have done with families how much this school is needed.”
- “I would love to be a part of this school.”
- “You can see what the needs are in primary schools – there’s no excuse not to know what’s coming in secondary terms.”

### 7.3 Reflections and Mitigations

The Trust has reflected on the above responses and believes the majority of participants support the opening of Oak Tree School, as well as supporting the proposed Admissions Statement and curriculum.

Those who answered ‘Don’t Know’, regarding the Admissions Statement and curriculum, did so because they had not yet seen it. In response to this MET has now ensured that the Statement of Provision has been made even more accessible on the Oak Tree School website. It can be found [here](#).

Issues were raised during the survey, to which we have given further consideration in this section.

The issues raised (in section 7.2 above) related to

- A. The therapeutic approaches being used
- B. School size
- C. Location of pupil population
- D. The level of need that the school caters for

- E.** The distribution of school funding in the area
- F.** MET's motive for opening the new school
- G.** Traffic & road safety

The Trust would like to respond to these issues raised.

In addition, similar questions were raised by more than one respondent during the consultation events which have been paraphrased and answered here:

**Q. What cohort is the school aimed at? Are these academically able children or children who are academically behind? What level of need is going to be catered for?**

A. The school will cater for students with complex learning needs, such as SEMH and ASD, who can access the national curriculum and who would struggle in the mainstream education environment.

**Q. Will pupils from West Berkshire be eligible?**

A. The school will meet the needs of 75 pupils from both Wokingham and Reading Boroughs.

**Q. Will the child's EHCP have to be finalised before naming a place or can Oak Tree admit the child whilst an EHCP is still in draft form?**

A. Children will need to have a finalised EHCP to start Oak Tree School, but Oak Tree can also help with the drafting of the EHCP.

**Q. What range of qualifications will be on offer? Will there be academic qualifications as well as life skills? Will the school offer GCSEs?**

A. The school will offer a range of teaching, with equal focus on academic qualifications, personal development and enrichment elements. The school will follow the Key Stages, and will offer GCSEs, with more support offered than in the mainstream system.

**Q. Will MET be seeking to collaborate with other SEMH providers in the local area?**

A. MET has collaborated with Brighter Futures for Children in the creation of Oak Tree School, which is an organisation that delivers education services and care for children with SEND. As part of this collaboration and beyond, MET will be seeking to collaborate with other SEND providers.

**Q. What do you know about SEN?**

A. There is already a special school within the Trust that provides for children with SEMH needs and the Trust has broad expertise in providing for children with SEN, within mainstream and special settings.

One question was sent to MET by email from a District Councillor, which was also repeated in response to the survey. It was as follows:

**Q. Where will the proposed Oak Tree School be located?**

A. Oak Tree School will be located in Winnersh, next to Wheatfield Primary School, in Wokingham Borough Council. The site is still to be finally confirmed and further work is underway to make sure the school site is fit for purpose.

## 8. Summary

### 8.1 The consultation in numbers

- **5000+** emails promoting the consultation;
- The consultation lasted **42 days** or 6 weeks;
- **49 stakeholders** attended one of 2 Consultation Events with MET CEO and members of staff
- Stakeholders asked MET staff **20+ questions** at the consultation events, and **8 questions** when responding to the survey;
- **51 surveys** were completed;
- **704 views** of the consultation page on the Oak Tree School website, with 590 being unique page views.
- **86.3% of respondents agreed** that the Trust should enter into a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State and open in September 2022.

### 8.2 Summary of approach and findings

The methodology used was fully compliant with S10 of the 2010 Academies Act and was successful in raising awareness of the consultation process.

The consultation was both thorough and comprehensive, with all stakeholders having the opportunity to engage with the Trust and discuss issues of concern to them.

The responses to the statutory consultation survey and the consultation events demonstrate that an overwhelming majority of respondents were in favour of the proposal to establish a special school in Wokingham and Reading Borough Councils.

Only 11 negative comments were received during the 6-week consultation period. These have been addressed in section 7.3 above.

The range of questions asked at the meetings and listed in **Appendix 8** highlights the issues discussed and illustrates the willingness of attendees to engage with Trust about their plans.

Throughout the consultation exercise contact details for the Trust were widely disseminated.

## 9. Conclusion and Recommendations

### 9.1 Conclusion

Sections 5 and 6 of this report evidences the Trusts open and inclusive methodology behind the consultation in fulfilment of the Trust's duty to undertake a S10 statutory consultation.

The summary findings contained in section 7 and 8 of this report show the overwhelming local support for the opening of the proposed Oak Tree school.

Section 7.3 sets out the Trust's response and mitigations to the 11 respondents who raised concerns during the consultation. The Trust believes that these issues have been considered during the pre-opening phase of the project and the proposal represents the best way forward for the future generations of SEND pupils in Reading and Wokingham, as well as stakeholders and the wider communities.

The Trust is pleased to be able to use this opportunity to clarify its response to these concerns.

### 9.2 Acknowledgements

The Trustees and Senior Team at MET would like to express their gratitude to all respondents and participants in the consultation, who have supported the opening of Oak Tree School by sharing their feedback, asking questions, and taking the time to contribute their views.

### 9.3 Recommendations

In response to this consultation, it is recommended that the Trust:

- Approve the contents of this report and submits it to the DfE;
- Publishes this report on the Oak Tree School website as a record of the consultation and feedback to the participants and wider stakeholders;
- Continue to share updates with stakeholders, through the school website and stakeholder database;
- MET continue with its pre-opening work for Oak Tree School in the knowledge that no significant barriers or opposition to their proposals have been identified; and
- Subject to DfE approval of this report, MET recognise that they have fulfilled their duty to undertake a Statutory Section 10 stakeholder consultation exercise regarding the opening of the proposed school.

Oak Tree School has been developed in partnership with the Department for Education (DfE), Brighter Futures for Children on behalf of Reading Borough Council, Wokingham Borough Council and Maiden Erlegh Trust, to serve the communities of Reading and Wokingham. It is anticipated that the intake will be largely drawn from Reading and Wokingham, offering 150 places, with the original proposal designed to meet the needs of 75 children from each borough when full. It will provide high-quality education for children with special educational needs, helping them to meet their aspirations and preparing them for the next stage of their lives. The school's ethos will, in partnership with all stakeholders, focus on education and therapies that are relevant to the needs of our children and young people, optimism for their future and joy in the daily life of the school. Relationships with pupils will be built on a foundation of respect and kindness, using therapeutic approaches to behaviour management and social and communication needs.

In particular, the school environment will be such that every child and their parents feel welcome and one where all children have a sense of belonging.

Oak Tree School is a co-educational special school which provides 150 places for children in the age range 5-18 with an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) for Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) and/or Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC).

For a child to be admitted, the school must be named, by a local authority, in the child's Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

Where a local authority has carried out a statutory assessment and decided to issue an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP), it will issue a draft plan to parents.

Parents wishing their children to benefit from the provision should ask their local authority to name the school in their child's EHCP.

However, the final decision on the school to be named rests with the local authority responsible for maintaining the plan.

## FAQs



### **What is a free school?**

Free schools are independent, state-funded schools with the same legal status as academies.

### **Will the school be able to make a profit?**

No. The school will be run on a not-for-profit basis by Maiden Erlegh Trust. The school will be run by the Headteacher and their leadership team and they will be answerable to a Local Advisory Board.

### **What does it mean to enter into a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State for Education?**

When an academy enters into a Funding Agreement, they effectively enter into a contract between themselves and the Secretary of State for Education. This contract, or Funding Agreement, is how academies are held accountable to the Department for Education.

### **Will funding the school mean there will be less money for the other special and mainstream provision in the area?**

No. Funding for Maiden Erlegh Trust will be worked out equivalent to the funding available to other special schools in the area and it will not reduce the overall funding available.

### **Will Oak Tree School be inspected by Ofsted?**

Yes. The school will be subject to inspection in the same way that other schools are. All new schools are also inspected by Ofsted prior to the school opening and receive ongoing scrutiny from the DfE.

### **How will the school be accountable?**

The school will be run by a Local Advisory Board who will be accountable to the Trustees of Maiden Erlegh Trust. In addition, the school will be accountable to the Secretary of State for Education through the terms of its Funding Agreement. The school will, of course, be accountable day to day to parents/carers and the wider community.

### **Can the Trust still progress with pre-opening the school during a pandemic?**

Yes, the Trust has the capacity to deliver operational and strategic developments during this time. Covid-19 hasn't removed either the need or the capacity to develop future schools to meet the needs of SEND pupils now and for generations to come.

The contractors' work on site to construct the school and the Trust's work on the strategic development and educational planning have been carried out in compliance with Covid guidelines. Furthermore, this consultation will be conducted virtually to ensure the safety of all participants.

### WELCOME TO OAK TREE SCHOOL



Maiden Erlegh Trust is delighted to be leading the Oak Tree School project in partnership between Brighter Futures for Children, Reading Borough Council and Wokingham Borough Council. As a local education provider, Maiden Erlegh Trust, recognises the need for this extra specialist provision and what it will mean to children, families and other schools.

Our vision for Oak Tree School is clear. It will first and foremost be a high-quality school community. The ethos will be one of relevance, optimism, care and joy for all, and relationships will be built on a foundation of respect and kindness and therapeutic approaches. Fundamental is that we will not operate a “deficit” approach, rather one of supporting difference and adapting to need, and most importantly celebrating what the children and young people can achieve.

We believe that pupils and students thrive in environments where “opportunity, diversity and success” are seen as positive and achievable for each and everyone, and where they are nurtured as individuals. Oak Tree School will have skilled, dedicated and empathetic staff who will work with families and partner organisations to ensure that every child in our care:



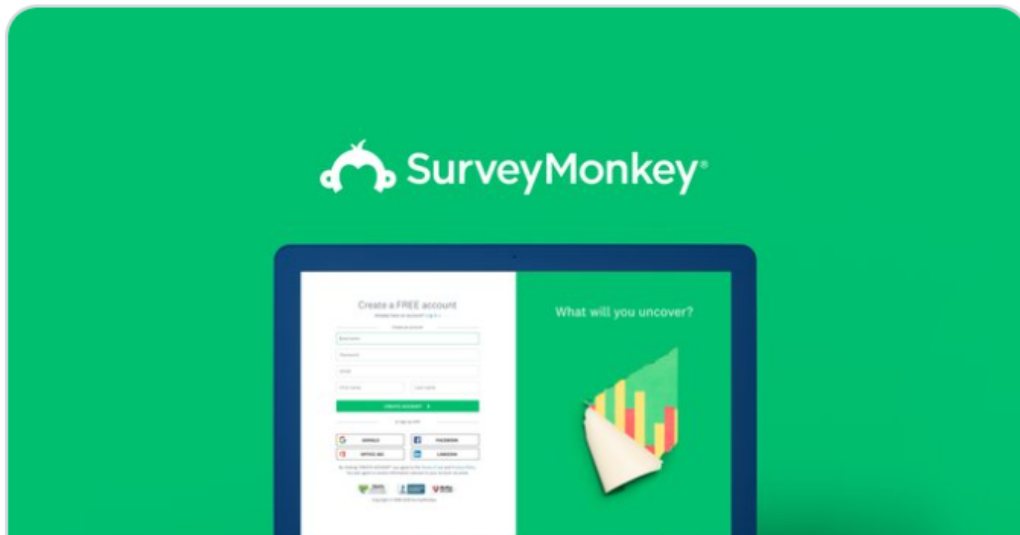

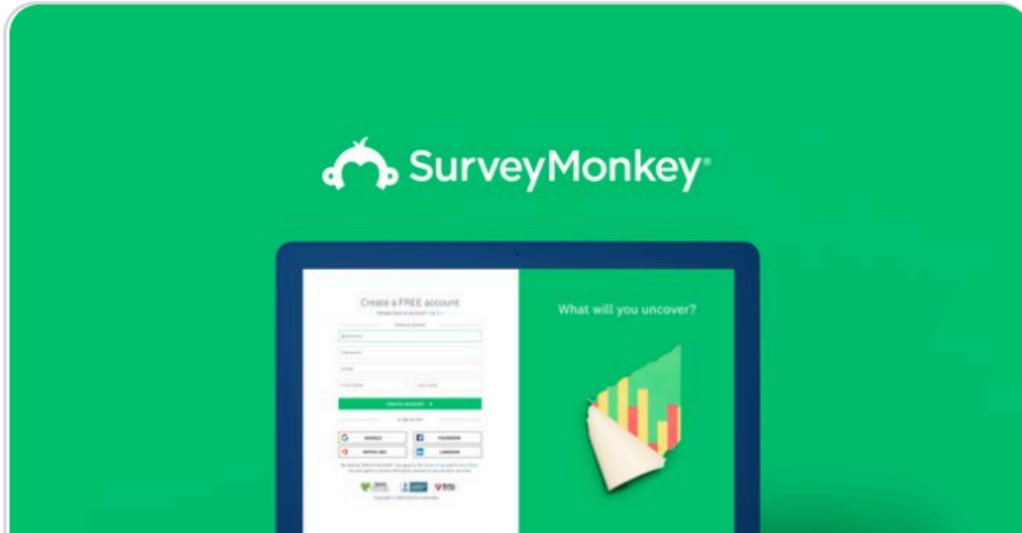

## Appendix 8: Questions Asked at Engagement Events

### Key Questions from Oak Tree School Consultation Events

**Q. What type of children's needs will be catered for and what interventions will OTS be providing?**

A. Oak Tree School will cater for children with ASD and/or SEMH needs. The school will provide numerous interventions such as speech and language therapy, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and canine therapy.

**Q. Will children need to have an EHCP finalised before naming the school or would the school admit children whose EHCPs are still being drafted?**

A. Children will need to have a finalised EHCP to start Oak Tree School, but Oak Tree can also play a part in the drafting of the EHCP.

**Q. Will the school have its own governing body within the Trust?**

A. Maiden Erlegh Trust has a Board of Trustees, but each school in the Trust has a Local Advisory Board that looks after the school in their care and has responsibility for community links.

**Q. How will you share best practice to ensure the school is as good as it can be?**

A. There is a pre-existing range of age and ability within Maiden Erlegh Trust schools, and the Trust is committed to ensure we are exchanging and sharing of expertise, both formally (e.g CPD, training, conferences), and informally through knowledge sharing.

**Q. What are you doing to ensure there is a voice from the Winnersh community that will be heard?**

A. Oak Tree School will engage in regular outreach work with all local stakeholders to make sure feedback is heard, and the community's needs are being met.

**Q. How many places will be available in the first year and across which year groups?**

A. The school will start with filling year 7 (KS3), and then move into year 3 and year 10. While it may not be filled at the beginning we expect to be at capacity rapidly.

**Q. How many children will be in each class?**

A. Most likely, there will be around 6-8 pupils in each class.

**Q. How will the numbers in each year group work (primary v secondary)?**

A. The school will be mainly secondary.

**Q. Will there be provision for places to be available at Oak Tree School to start in Year 3, 4, 5 and Years 8 and 9, outside of a usual transition year, for children who are facing learning difficulties such as anxiety, or sensory issues at mainstream?**

A. Children in a mainstream school would be considered outside of the usual transition year, if there are spaces available.

**Q. What are the timescales regarding the site and building? How long will it take to build the school and when is it likely to open?**

A. Construction should be starting at the end of summer. The school is planning to open in September 2022.

**Q. When will you start recruitment, and how much staff will you look to recruit?**

A. Recruitment will begin in Autumn as we will need some posts to be filled during the Spring, with others starting in September 2022. There are likely to be around 120 members of teaching and non-teaching staff when the school is full with 150 pupils.

## Q&As

- What type of children's needs will be catered for and what interventions will OTS be providing?
- Will children need to have an EHCP finalised before naming the school or would the school admit children whose EHCPs are still being drafted?
- Do pupils need a main diagnosis in anything specific?
- Will the school have its own governing body within the Trust?
- What are you doing to ensure there is a voice from the Winnersh community that will be heard?
- How will the numbers in each year group work (primary v secondary)?
- Will there be provision for places to be available at Oak Tree School for children to start in Year 3, 4, 5 and Years 8 and 9 (so outside of a usual transition year) who can not cope for whatever reason, eg anxiety, or sensory issues at mainstream. The gap between them and their peers may have opened and be quite wide.
- What is the plan for filling the school: how many places will be available in the first year and across which year groups?
- Where will the school be located?
- What are the timescales regarding the site and building? How long will it take to build the school and when is it likely to open?
