BEHAVIOUR 101 AT OAK TREE SCHOOL





CPI TRAINING

All staff at Oak Tree School are trained in Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI) training, which emphasizes verbal de-escalation skills to manage and reduce challenging behaviour before it reaches a crisis point. This training is rooted in traumainformed practice.

PHYSICAL INTERVENTION

Physical intervention is only used as a last resort to ensure the safety of the child and others. It is employed after an agreement has been reached by the support team working with the child.

COMMUNICATION WITH PARENTS

If physical intervention is required, parents are informed on the same day this will be carried out in the autumn term by SLT communication. A structured debrief process is undertaken by staff to prevent similar situations in the future, and parents can request information regarding the incident at any time.



INCIDENT RECORDING

All behavioural incidents are logged on a whole-school system called CPOMS. Parents can request information from CPOMS whenever they need it.

FREQUENCY SHEETS

Staff log low-level behaviours on individual frequency logs, which are reviewed by the senior leadership team (SLT) every two weeks to identify trends or patterns. Actions based on these findings are communicated to class teams.

BEHAVIOUR INTERVENTION MEETINGS (BIMS)



If there are concerns about a particular child's behaviour, supported by incident logs or frequency logs, a behaviour intervention meeting is held. This meeting is multi-disciplinary and solution-focused. Parents are informed, and a report is provided to them. Actions arising from the meeting are implemented promptly.



BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT PLANS



Each child has a behaviour support plan (BSP) that is collaboratively developed with parents. These plans outline the levels of support and intervention the child needs for safety and regulation, and they are shared with parents for discussion.

COMMUNICATION WITH THE SCHOOL

Parents are encouraged to contact a member of the senior leadership team if they have any further questions or concerns.


Primary Update
